

Liebe Waldseer!

Willkommen in Waldsee – Welcome to *Waldsee*! We're looking forward to seeing you! I'm writing to tell you a few things about our *Waldsee* community this summer.

Registration hours on opening Monday are between 2:00 pm and 4:30 pm. Please try to come during this period as the staff needs time before you arrive to prepare and time after you arrive to get to know you and help you settle in before the evening meal.

Just like any trip abroad, arriving at *Waldsee* means going through *Zoll* (customs) and the traditional customs inspection. The Concordia Language Villages office is sending you a passport. Please have it ready when you arrive. It will be stamped and your luggage checked for *Schmuggelwaren* (contraband), which is outlined in the [Parent's Handbook](#). I also ask that you not bring food items, such as candy, cookies, chips, etc. because keeping these items in the cabins can become a health risk and attract little woodland creatures into our living areas. Since we are an immersion program, cell phones are another item that will not be allowed to be used during your stay at *Waldsee*. Any medications (including non-prescription drugs such as aspirin) will be kept and distributed by our health-care provider. Don't worry! Everything that is not a food item will be returned when you leave. Unfortunately, we do not have the ability to store contraband food items – these items will be donated to the local food shelf. We just want to offer a real living and learning experience with the German language and German-speaking cultures--it's all part of the *Waldsee* game.

Your journey then begins when you choose a German name, get a *Namensschild*, or name tag, and exchange your American dollars for *Euro*, which you will deposit in your *Waldsee* bank account. We have two village stores ([Café Einbeck](#) and [KaDeWa](#)) where you can buy European candy, snacks and souvenirs.

You'll then be able to settle into your new home in a *Haus* (cabin) named after a German, Austrian or Swiss city. Your *Betreuer* (counselors) are from German-speaking countries or Americans who have studied German extensively or lived in German-speaking countries. They'll be on hand to help you settle in and answer any questions you may have about the German language or life at *Waldsee*. Cabin assignments are made carefully in advance according to several factors, so please respect this decision.

Also, as you pack remember to bring your camera (since many cameras look alike, it would be a good idea to label it with your name), your musical instrument if you play one, clothes for all types of weather, including cold and wet weather, and a native costume (like a [Dirndl](#) or [Lederhosen](#)), should you have one. We never really need real "dress up" clothing, although we might have a German restaurant and dance night, at which the clothes you were playing *Handball* in all week might not be appropriate. The mosquitoes in Minnesota love to learn German at *Waldsee* too, so mosquito spray and flashlights are particularly useful *am Abend* (in the evening). The most important things to bring, however, are enthusiasm and an open attitude to new experiences.

We're also going to learn a lot of German, and we're going to have fun doing it! The counselors are

both caring and a little wacky--many come back year after year from both Europe and all across America because of the great time we have. If you're returning, we have some of the best aspects of past *Waldsee* summers ready for you, plus some great new things to offer! And if you're coming for the first time, don't worry--we'll do everything we can to make you feel comfortable, make friends, have fun and learn a lot in *unserer Gemeinschaft* --our *Waldsee* community.

Because *Waldsee* is an immersion program that simulates a visit to another country, parents are discouraged from making non-emergency calls to you. However, your parents should feel free to call me with any questions or concerns. Remind your friends and family to write to you while you're away at camp! We will distribute mail once a day Mondays through Saturday. The address you can share with them is listed below. Your family may also use our free one-way e-mail service by using [this link](#). We will print e-mails and deliver them during mail call.

At 10:00 am on the last Saturday of your session we put on a closing program for your parents and the public. After that it will be time to say *Auf Wiedersehen in Waldsee* and you can be on your way by about 11:15. Please remind your family not to arrive before 9:30 am because you will be busy packing and preparing for the program.

Please let us know if you or your parents have any questions before you leave. The [handbook](#) can answer many questions -- or you can call the Language Villages office in Moorhead, Minnesota.

If this is your first time at *Waldsee*, I look forward to meeting you. If you are returning, I look forward to seeing you again and to have another unforgettable *Waldsee* experience!
